What's the difference between regular, honors & AP?

Regular	Honors	Advanced Placement
Follows AL course of study	Follows AL course of study	Teachers follow national AP standards/pacing guide and give AP-level tests/assignments.
Slower paced than Honors/AP.	Faster paced, higher expectations	College-level course on our campus. You must have the work ethic. If you don't like to read ASSIGNED material, write about it, or study/analyze ideas, AP is not for you! Required summer assignment.
End of course exam	End of course exam	AP Exam (avg of \$90) that could earn college credit with a "Qualifying Score." Participating colleges all have their own "qualifying scores" for certain AP courses.

***You can mix and match what type classes you take. You don't have to take "ALL Regular" or "ALL Advanced."** Ex: Regular Biology, Regular WHY9, but Honors English and Honors Geometry

What is a GPA?

Grade Point Average

Every college application and scholarship application asks for GPA.

Every grade has a point value.

- » A= 4 points
- » B= 3 points
- » C= 2 points
- » D= 1 point

How does GPA add up?

Example

English 9	B (3)
Algebra 1	C (2)
World History	C (2)
Biology	B (3)
Career Prep	A (4)
Art I	B (3)
PE	<u>A (4)</u>
<hr/>	
	21 total

- **Add all classes together. 21 points**
- **Divide 21 by the number of classes: 7.**

$$21 / 7 =$$

$$\text{GPA} = 3.0$$

Weighted Courses

Honors/AP courses are “weighted” courses with additional GPA weight.

- **Honors Courses = 0.5**
- **Dual Enrollment Courses = 0.5**
- **Advanced Placement Courses = 1.0**

(You must take the AP exam to get 1.0 weighted credit.)

In addition...

- **Foreign languages** are considered to be “Honors” are are weighted = 0.5

How does weighted GPA add up?

Example

Honors English 9	B (3.5)
Honors Algebra I	C (2.5)
Honors Biology	B (3.5)
AP World Hist.	C(2.5*)
PE	A (4)
Career prep	A (4)
Art I	B (3)

- **Add all classes together = 23 points**
- **Divide 23 by the number of classes (7).**

GPA= 3.28 weighted

** Another .5 gets added when AP exam is taken (3.35).*

CLUBS

Attendance Matters

Nine absences per school year with parent/guardian note. After that, only doctor's notes can excuse your absences.

- FHS absences are calculated by **CLASS PERIOD**, and not by “day” or “half day” like at FMS. Early dismissals = period absences.
- Can be denied credit for more than 10 unexcused absences in any **class period**.
- **Excused absences:** you have 3 days to make up work.
- **Unexcused absence:** you are not be able to make up work.
 - “UN” in the gradebook, which equals a “0.”
- Testing Center - make arrangements with teachers.

It is the STUDENT'S responsibility to communicate with their teachers and make up missed work! Time to take on more responsibility!

Allow your student to learn how to advocate!

Encourage

Encourage students to check grades in PowerSchool and show you what current grades are. Do not wait until the end of the quarter and be sure all absences that can be excused are AND make-up the work.

Attend

Attend tutoring. Free math help in the AM and PM. We also have Peer Tutors

Engage

Encourage students to engage in conversations with teachers about concerns.
